<a href="#">Telluride Association Summer Seminar</a>	<p>- The Telluride Association Summer Seminars (TASS) are six-week educational experiences for high school sophomores and juniors. We offer two programs: TASS in Critical Black Studies and TASS in Anti-Oppressive Studies</p> <p>- Students may only apply to one program per year. Both programs are open to both sophomores and juniors. TASS will be hosted at Cornell University, the University of Michigan, and the University of Maryland in the summer. One TASS-AOS seminar and one TASS-CBS seminar will be offered at each program location.</p> <p>- Participants in TASS will attend a college-level, discussion-based academic seminar, develop critical reading and writing skills, and explore the principles and practice of democratic community living. We cover all program costs for every student, including tuition, books, room and board, field trips, and facilities fees. Students may apply for additional financial aid for travel costs and to replace earnings from summer jobs.</p>	<p>Need to be nominated by 12/01 and application is 01/05</p>	<p>- High school sophomores and juniors ("rising juniors" and "rising seniors"). You do not need to be a United States citizen or attend a US high school to apply.</p> <p>- You do not need any academic experience with the topic of your TASS program, and we do not expect you to have any.</p> <p>- We do not consider test scores and high school grades important for the TASS application process. Instead, the most important part of the application for us is the essays. The TASS application essays give applicants a chance to show us their personalities and demonstrate their thoughtfulness, critical thinking, curiosity, and interest in social and political issues. Be sure to allow yourself plenty of time to complete the essays.</p> <p>- We evaluate all TASS applicants in light of their circumstances. You do not need to have attended any specific type of school, or taken advanced or college classes, to be accepted or succeed at TASS.</p> <p>- Because TASS is an experience in community living, we try to select students who are concerned for the well-being of others and who are flexible enough to enjoy the challenge of interacting with people from very different perspectives and experiences.</p> <p>- Selected candidates are interviewed in March or April by Telluride Association board members and program alumni. If you are selected for an interview, you will need to request a transcript and letter of recommendation immediately after you hear from Telluride Association about your interview. You will also be asked to submit an additional essay you wrote for school.</p> <p>- We will provide more instructions about this process to you directly. Final selection of TASS participants and alternates will be based on interviews and written applications. Our final decisions will be announced in early May.</p>
